ITINERARY

COLORADO GROUSE

April 9-20, 2026

- an annotated list of the birds recorded on a previous year's Field Guides trip to the area, with comments by guide(s)
 on notable species or sightings (may be downloaded from our web site)
- a detailed information bulletin with important logistical information and answers to questions regarding accommodations, air arrangements, clothing, currency, customs and immigration, documents, health precautions, and personal items
- a Field Guides checklist for preparing for and keeping track of the birds we see on the tour
- after the conclusion of the tour, a list of birds seen on the tour

There is no better place in North America for gallinaceous birds than the state of Colorado—and no better time of year to find them than in April. Our goal on this tour is to seek out the prairie-chickens (Lesser and Greater) of the eastern plains, the Sharp-tailed Grouse and two sage-grouse (Gunnison and Greater) of the intermountain parks, and the sometimes-difficult Dusky Grouse of the mountains and ridges. Sprinkled in there could be Wild Turkey, Scaled and Gambel's quail, Ring-necked Pheasant, and the harder-to-find Northern Bobwhite. Weather permitting, we'll also make an attempt to find the difficult White-tailed Ptarmigan, resident in high-elevation areas above treeline.

This trip might best be described as a "compare and contrast" tour. That is to say, we'll be visiting distinctly different North American biomes, making it possible to encounter several closely related pairs or trios of birds in Colorado and adjacent states. Some of these are East-West differences, but others are more complicated: Gunnison vs. Greater sage-

grouse; Lesser vs. Greater prairie-chickens; Say's vs. Eastern phoebes; Eastern, Mountain, and Western bluebirds; Clark's vs. Western grebes—and the list goes on.

In addition, we'll take the opportunity to compare and contrast the birds of the various regions of the state: the Rockies, the eastern plains, and the intermountain basins (those broad valleys known as "parks"). But most importantly, we'll see Colorado grouse and prairie-chickens in their elaborate, boisterous, and colorful breeding displays, usually on "leks". We often see more than 140 bird species and 20 species of mammals by the end of the tour, and should have a better understanding of Colorado's birds and wildlife, mountains, and plains. Join us on this wonderful, action-packed tour in search of Colorado's grouse.

We want to be sure you are on the right tour! Below is a description of the physical requirements of the tour. If you are concerned about the difficulty, please contact us about this and be sure to fully explain your concerns. We want to make sure you have a wonderful time with us, so if you are uncomfortable with the requirements, just let us know and we can help you find a better fitting tour. Field Guides will not charge you a change or cancellation fee if you opt out within 10 days of depositing.


Physical requirements of this tour

- **TRAILS:** Although much of our birding will be at leks or along roadsides, we may take a couple short hikes (of less than a mile). There is a chance that we may encounter deep snow in the mountain passes, so you should expect to hike through some snow, especially in pursuit of White-tailed Ptarmigan.
- **POTENTIAL CHALLENGES:** We will be changing hotels almost every night, so be prepared to unpack and repack your luggage daily. Also, we will cover large distances each day, so expect to spend a significant amount of time in the vans.
- PACE: Because this tour covers more than 2000 miles (over 200 miles per day), the pace will be fairly brisk. On most mornings, we will be up very early, sometimes before 5:00 a.m., in order to get to leks pre-dawn. This tour is not a good fit for participants who require a lot of sleep.
- **ELEVATION:** We will be traveling over six mountain passes ranging from 8,000 to 12,000 feet in elevation. The highest elevation where we will spend a night is in Walden, at 8,099 feet. Anyone with significant heart or respiratory problems, or difficulty in walking/hiking should consult the Field Guides office before signing up for the tour, as shortness of breath and fatigue are common issues to consider at elevation.

- **WEATHER:** The weather is incredibly variable in Colorado in April, so it's prudent to be prepared for temperatures between 10° and 80° F (seriously!). Because it can shift from warm to cold quickly based on fast-moving storms or elevation changes, please plan to dress in layers and bring cold weather gear to stay warm and dry in potentially deep snow and very cold temperatures.
- **VEHICLE SEATING:** So that each participant has equal opportunity during our travel, we employ a seat rotation system on all tours. Participants will need to be flexible enough to maneuver to the back of the vehicle on occasion. Those who experience motion sickness will need to bring adequate medication for the duration of the tour, as we are not able to reserve forward seats for medical conditions.
- BATHROOM BREAKS: We will plan to make regular breaks every 2-3 hours, and most stops will have indoor
 restrooms; however, in remote areas or before our early morning lek visits, it will be necessary to make comfort
 stops in nature.
- **OPTING OUT:** As we are not staying in the same location each night, participants will not be able to opt to sit out for a day or half-day.

If you are uncertain about whether this tour is a good match for your abilities, please don't hesitate to contact our office staff; if they cannot directly answer your queries, they will put you in touch with one of the guides.

About the Birding Areas



Colorado is one of the great birding states of the American West and the best place for gallinaceous birds in North America, particularly in April. But there are many other species of birdlife and wildlife to observe as well at this time of year, and we'll be seeing them against a stunning landscape.

Eastern Plains—Spring bird migration will be starting up and most apparent on the eastern plains of Colorado and western Kansas, an area that includes the riparian foothill country of the Pueblo area, the vast riparian habitat of the lower Arkansas River, numerous reservoirs, and the short-grass prairie habitat of the Pawnee Grasslands. We'll visit leks of both Lesser and Greater prairie-chickens to observe their elaborate displays as the sun rises over the plains. Other birds we'll hope to see in this section of Colorado and Kansas

include Western and Clark's grebes, Scaled Quail, Mountain Plover, Burrowing Owl, Ferruginous Hawk, Sage Thrasher, Curve-billed Thrasher, Canyon Towhee, and Loggerhead Shrike.

Foothills, Mountains, and Intermountain Parks—The foothills of the Front Range are often thawed out for our trip, but there might still be plenty of snow in the mountains. Regardless of the weather conditions, the scenery will be spectacular and the birding exciting. Weather permitting, we'll visit Loveland Pass in search of the elusive White-tailed Ptarmigan. In addition, we will stop in the mountains and foothills to search for scarce Dusky Grouse and other mountain specialties. In the intermountain parks, we'll visit Greater and Gunnison sage-grouse as well as Sharp-tailed Grouse displaying on their respective leks, plus a variety of other birds, hopefully including Rough-legged Hawk, Golden Eagle, and Swainson's Hawk. Our travels will take us over the Front Range and to the birding hotspots of the area such as Yampa and Gunnison basins and North, Middle, and South parks.

Colorado Plateau: Plateaus, Mesas, and Valleys—The western portion of the state is the most dramatic and colorful section of Colorado. Our birding travels will take us to reservoirs and canyons such as Black Canyon of the Gunnison National Park and Colorado National Monument. We pass alongside the great rivers of western Colorado, including the Uncompangre, Gunnison, and Colorado, enjoying panoramic views of western Colorado's most spectacular landscape

features—the San Juan Mountains, Uncompandere Plateau, and the granddaddy of them all, the Grand Mesa. Birdlife here is wonderfully diverse, with all three species of rosy-finches in the higher elevations and Gambel's Quail, Rock and Canyon wrens, Pinyon Jay, Juniper Titmouse, and Black-throated, Brewer's, and Sagebrush sparrows in the lower elevations.

Itinerary for Colorado Grouse

Day 1, Thu, Apr 9. Arrival in Denver. Plan to arrive in Denver before our 7 p.m. meetup this evening. Upon arrival, exit the west side of the airport through door 512, walk to "Island 3" and look for the red sign for the Holiday Inn Express. A white shuttle will come by every 30 minutes. You can call the Holiday Inn Express Denver Airport at (303) 373-4100 for assistance. We'll gather in the lobby at 7 p.m. for a brief meetup before heading for dinner at a nearby restaurant. If you don't arrive before our meetup time, check at the front desk for a message from your guide(s). Night in Denver.

Day 2, Fri, Apr 10. Denver to Pueblo. We will meet at the hotel lobby for breakfast at 5:30 a.m. We'll load up bags at 6:15 a.m. and depart for a full day of birding. Today, we'll visit a few sites around Denver and Colorado Springs then begin our journey south towards Pueblo. We'll be sure to stop along the way to scan for Mountain Plovers in the open grasslands. Night in Pueblo.

Day 3, Sat, Apr 11. Pueblo to Kansas plains. Our travels today will take us in an easterly direction (roughly following the Arkansas River) as we position ourselves to visit lekking Lesser Prairie-Chickens tomorrow morning. This imperiled species is declining rapidly and is no longer reliable at accessible leks in Colorado. En route, we will stop at several reservoirs, riparian woodlots, and feedlots. Birds we'll be looking out for include Clark's Grebe, Cinnamon Teal, Franklin's Gull, American White Pelican, Mountain Plover, Burrowing Owl, Scaled Quail, Wild Turkey, Loggerhead Shrike, Eastern and Say's phoebes, Sage and Curve-billed thrashers, Swainson's and Ferruginous hawks, and Yellow-headed Blackbird. By the end of the day, our checklists should be brimming with ducks, grebes, raptors, shorebirds, sparrows, and blackbirds. We will cross from Mountain Time to Central Time today. Night in Scott City, Kansas.

Day 4, Sun, Apr 12. Eastern Plains to Wray. This is the day we've all been anticipating, our first experience at a lek. The rare Lesser Prairie-Chicken will be displaying as the sun rises. We'll need to be out very early to increase our chances for success. After (we hope) the excitement of seeing the prairie-chickens, we'll enjoy a hearty breakfast and then work our way northward and westward to Wray, Colorado. En route, we'll keep eyes peeled for Rough-legged and Swainson's hawks, Long-billed Curlew, and Eastern and Mountain bluebirds. We will cross from Central Time to Mountain Time today, gaining back the hour we lost yesterday. Night in Wray, Colorado.

Day 5, Mon, Apr 13. Wray to Golden. We'll be up early today to observe the second of the three members of genus *Tympanuchus*—the Greater Prairie-Chicken. After breakfast, we'll head northwestward, skirting the shortgrass prairie habitat of the Pawnee Grasslands as we target prairie specialists like Thick-billed Longspur and Mountain Plover. We will look out, too, for the harder-to-find Chestnut-collared Longspurs, Long-billed Curlew, and Prairie Falcon. Time permitting, we may also check a few reservoirs for dabbling ducks and shorebirds. Night in Golden, Colorado (on the west side of Denver).

Day 6, Tue, Apr 14. Golden to Walden. Today, we'll start early and head from the foothills of the Front Range into the mountains themselves. Weather and road conditions permitting, we should be able to traverse Loveland Pass where the elusive White-tailed Ptarmigan can be found. Stops at some high-elevation feeders in Silverthorne might produce Browncapped and possibly two more rosy-finches, as well as other finches. From Silverthorne we'll head north towards Walden where we'll spend the night. If weather conditions look good, we'll try for Boreal Owl after dinner. Night in Walden, Colorado.

Day 7, Wed, Apr 15. Walden to Craig. This day we'll visit a Greater Sage-grouse lek outside of Walden, then we'll make our way towards Craig via Steamboat Springs stopping for Golden Eagle, Canada Jay, and American Dipper along the way. Night in Craig, Colorado.

Day 8, Thu, Apr 16. Craig to Grand Junction. Our early morning outing will take us to a private ranch where we hope to see strutting Sharp-tailed Grouse. These hills and valleys are also home to Swainson's Hawk, Juniper Titmouse, Vesper Sparrow, and Sandhill Crane. After a morning with the Sharp-tails, we'll make our way south towards Grand Junction and spend the afternoon at Colorado National Monument where we'll spend the afternoon enjoying some of the most spectacular scenery of the tour. The incredible Monument Valley overlook provides awe-inspiring views of the impressive

geologic formations of Wingate sandstone cloaked in juniper and pinyon pine woodland. Here, it's possible to see Pinyon Jay, Gambel's Quail, Golden Eagle, Peregrine Falcon, Rock, Canyon, and Bewick's wrens, Juniper Titmouse, Bushtit, Woodhouse's Scrub-Jay, Black-throated Sparrow and Black-throated Gray Warbler. Night in Grand Junction, Colorado.

Day 9, Fri, Apr 17. Grand Junction to Montrose. We'll spend an early morning on the Colorado/Utah border in search of sagebrush species like Sagebrush Sparrow and Sage Thrasher, then we'll make our way south to Montrose. In the afternoon we'll visit the spectacular Black Canyon of the Gunnison where Dusky Grouse is possible, along with White-throated Swift, Slate-colored Fox Sparrow, Spotted Towhee and even Northern Pygmy-Owl. Night in Montrose.

Day 10, Sat, Apr 18. Birding around Montrose. Our goal this morning is the rare Gunnison Sage-Grouse displaying on its lek. Afterwards, we will climb in elevation in search of American Dipper, Brown-capped Rosy-Finch (and its more elusive cousins, Black and Gray-crowned), Evening Grosbeaks, Cassin's Finches, juncos, and mammals. An afternoon visit to the Black Canyon of the Gunnison National Park is a possibility. Night in Montrose, Colorado.

Day 11, Sun, Apr 19. Montrose to Denver. This day will be largely a travel day as we make our way from Montrose back to Denver. We'll make stops for Lewis's and Three-toed Woodpeckers along the way, and if we have yet to see a White-tailed Ptarmigan, we'll give that a shot at Loveland Pass. Night in Denver, Colorado.

Day 12, Mon, Apr 20. Depart Denver. You may plan your departure from Denver for any time today. Have a safe trip home!

Other Things You Need to Know

TOUR MANAGER: The manager for this tour is Caroline Lewis. Caroline will be happy to assist you in preparing for the tour. If you have any questions, please don't hesitate to call her!

ACCOMMODATIONS: Accommodations are in comfortable hotels, typically in familiar chains such as Holiday Inn Express, Best Western Plus, and Cobblestone Inn. In Walden, we stay at the family-owned North Park Inn & Suites.

AIR ARRANGEMENTS: Please arrive in Denver before 7 p.m. on April 9. The group will meet meet in the hotel lobby at 7:00 p.m. to go to dinner. You may make plans to depart Denver anytime on April 20.

Field Guides is a full-service travel agency and your tour manager will be happy to assist you with flights to join this tour. Field Guides does not charge a service fee for these services to clients booking a tour. However, we understand that tech-savvy clients often prefer to shop online or that you may wish to use mileage to purchase tickets. Regardless of which method you choose, your tour manager will be happy to provide assistance regarding ticket prices and schedules, along with rental cars and extra hotel nights as needed.

Please be sure to check with your tour manager prior to purchasing your ticket to make sure the flights you have chosen will work well with the tour itinerary and that the tour is sufficiently subscribed to operate. Once purchased, most airline tickets are non-refundable and carry a penalty to change. Field Guides cannot be responsible for these fees. Also, it is imperative that we receive a copy of your comprehensive flight itinerary—including any and all flights not covered in the tour fee—so that we may track you in the event of missed connections, delays, or other mishaps.

LUGGAGE: Please be aware that many airlines charge additional fees for checked bags. Updates could easily occur before your departure, so you may wish to contact your airline to verify their policy. Additional charges for bags on any flights, whether these are covered by the tour fee or not, will be the client's responsibility.

SMOKING: Almost all of our clients prefer a smoke-free environment. If you smoke, please be sensitive to the group and refrain from smoking at meals, in vehicles, and in proximity to the group on trails and elsewhere.

TOUR INCLUSIONS/EXCLUSIONS: The **tour fee** is \$5225 for one person in double occupancy from Denver. It includes all lodging from Day 1 through Day 11, all meals from dinner on Day 1 through breakfast on Day 12, all ground transportation, entrance fees, and the guide services of the tour leader(s). Tipping at group meals and for local guides is included in your tour fee and will be handled for the group by your Field Guides leader(s). However, if you would like to recognize your Field Guides leader(s) or any local guide(s) for exceptional service, it is entirely appropriate to tip. We emphasize that such tips are optional and not expected.

The above fee does <u>not</u> include your airfare to and from Denver, airport taxes, any checked or carry-on baggage charges imposed by the airlines, any alcoholic beverages, optional tips to local guides, phone calls, laundry, or other items of a personal nature.

The **single supplement** for the tour is \$1025. If you do not have a roommate but wish to share, we will try to pair you with a roommate from the tour; but if none is available, you will be billed for the single supplement. Our tour fees are based on double occupancy; one-half the cost of a double room is priced into the tour fee. The single supplement is calculated by taking the actual cost of a single room and subtracting one-half the cost of a double room (plus any applicable taxes).

TOUR REGISTRATION: To register for this tour, please contact us at <u>fieldguides.com/contact-us/</u>. Our office will be in touch with you by email by the next business day (Mon-Fri) with instructions on how to complete our new electronic registration form and medical questionnaire. (We are no longer accepting the paper version.)

Please mail your **deposit of \$525** per person, or see https://fieldguides.com/payment-options/ for our Payment Options. **Full payment** of the tour fee is due 180 days prior to departure, or **by October 11, 2025**. **We will bill you for the final payment at either 180 days or when the tour has reached sufficient subscription to operate, whichever date comes later**.

Since the cost of your trip insurance and airline tickets is generally non-refundable, please do not finalize these purchases until you have received final billing for the tour or have been advised that the tour is sufficiently subscribed to operate by your tour manager.

CANCELLATION POLICY: Refund of deposit and full payment, less \$100 handling fee, will be made if cancellation is received up to 180 days before departure. If cancellation occurs between 179 and 90 days before the departure date, 50% of the full tour fee is non-refundable, which would include the full deposit if the final payment has not yet been paid. Thereafter, all deposits and payments are not refundable and non- transferable.

Our cancellation policy only applies to payments made to Field Guides for tour (and any services included in those fees). Airline tickets not included in the tour fee and purchased separately often carry penalties for cancellation or change, or are sometimes totally non-refundable. Additionally, if you take out trip insurance the cost of that insurance is not refundable, so it is best to purchase the policy just prior to making full payment for the tour or at the time you purchase airline tickets, depending upon the airline's restrictions.

The right is reserved to cancel any tour prior to departure. In most such cases, full refund will constitute full settlement to the passenger. Note this exception, however: If you have been advised pre-tour that there is a non-refundable portion of your tour fee no matter the reason for Field Guides cancellation of the tour, that portion will not be refunded. The right is reserved to substitute in case of emergency another guide for the original one.

TRIP CANCELLATION & MEDICAL EMERGENCY INSURANCE: We strongly recommend you consider purchasing trip cancellation (including medical emergency) insurance to cover your investment in case of injury or illness to you or your family prior to or during a trip. Because we must remit early (and substantial) tour deposits to our suppliers, you acknowledge and agree that we will not issue a refund when cancellation occurs outside of our cancellation policy as published in the itinerary (see CANCELLATION POLICY). In addition, the Department of State strongly urges Americans to consult with their medical insurance company prior to traveling abroad to confirm whether their policy applies overseas and if it will cover emergency expenses such as a medical evacuation. US medical insurance plans seldom cover health costs incurred outside the United States unless supplemental coverage is purchased. Furthermore, US Medicare and Medicaid programs do not provide payment for medical services outside the United States.

When making a decision regarding health insurance, Americans should consider that many foreign doctors and hospitals require payment in cash prior to providing service and that a medical evacuation to the United States may cost well in excess of \$50,000. Uninsured travelers who require medical care overseas often face extreme difficulties. When consulting with your insurer prior to your trip, please ascertain whether payment will be made to the overseas healthcare provider or whether you will be reimbursed later for expenses that you incur.

US citizens will receive information from us regarding optional tour cancellation/emergency medical insurance. Our agent, CSA, will insure for trip cancellation and interruption, medical coverage, travel delay, baggage loss and delay, and emergency medical transportation. If you purchase the insurance prior to, or within 24 hours of making final payment for the tour, and cover all non-refundable parts of the trip (including any non-refundable flights and in some cases, other arrangements), pre-existing conditions are covered. You may purchase your CSA policy on-line by visiting our website at https://fieldguides.com/trip-cancellation-insurance/ and clicking the link to CSA. The CSA webpage also includes a contact number.

Currently we are unable to offer CSA insurance policies to residents of New York and Hawaii. We have had clients provide positive feedback after acquiring insurance thru InsureMyTrip (https://www.insuremytrip.com/) in the past, and would suggest that company as an alternative. When purchasing insurance with a company other than CSA, you will want to understand whether the timing of your purchase will affect coverage before paying your first deposit. Insurance purchase requirements can vary from company to company, and such requirements could limit your options if you do not look into this until making your final payment for your tour. Please let us know if you have any questions about this.

Please note, once the insurance is purchased it is non-refundable, so please check with your tour manager prior to making the purchase to assure the tour will operate as scheduled. Citizens of other countries are urged to consult their insurance broker.

RESPONSIBILITY: For and in consideration of the opportunity to participate in the tour, each tour participant and each parent or legal guardian of a tour participant who is under 18 agrees to release, indemnify, and hold harmless Field Guides Incorporated, its agents, servants, employees, shareholders, officers, directors, attorneys, and contractors as more fully set forth in the Release and Indemnity Agreement on the registration form. Field Guides Incorporated acts only as an agent for the passenger in regard to travel, whether by railroad, motorcar, motorcoach, boat, airplane, or other means, and assumes no liability for injury, damage, loss, accident, delay, or irregularity caused by defect in such vehicles or for any reason whatsoever, including the acts, defaults, or bankruptcies of any company or person engaged in conveying the passenger or in carrying out the arrangements of the tour. You acknowledge and agree that Field Guides Incorporated is not responsible for losses or additional expenses due to delay or changes in air or other services,

sickness, weather, strike, war, quarantine, or other causes. The tour participant shall bear all such losses and expenses. Field Guides Incorporated reserves the right to substitute hotels of similar category for those indicated and to make any changes in the itinerary where deemed necessary or caused by changes in air schedules. Field Guides Incorporated reserves the right to decline to accept or to retain any person as a member of any tour. Baggage is at owner's risk entirely.

Participants should be in good health and should consult a physician before undertaking a tour. If you have questions about the physical requirements of a tour, please contact our office for further information. Participants should prepare for the tour by reading the detailed itinerary, the information bulletin, and other pertinent matter provided by Field Guides. Each participant is responsible for bringing appropriate clothing and equipment as recommended in our bulletins.
