

s we write this, spring has arrived and early migrants are trickling in, soon to be followed by floods of warblers, thrushes, flycatchers, brilliant tanagers and buntings, grosbeaks, and more. Spring keeps us hopeful.

Our Texas Coast Migration and Big Bend tours are in progress and Doug Gochfeld and Mitch Lysinger are on the lookout for birds from Central Florida to the Keys. In early May, guides John Coons, Dave Stejskal, and Tom Johnson will be busy with four Arizona tours. Tom will continue celebrating spring in Cape May, where he now lives, and later in the month, in Pennsylvania, where he grew up. And this is not yet to mention Jay VanderGaast's Point Pelee tour, Eric Hynes and Cory Gregory's Maine tour, or Doug, Eric, and Tom's Colorado Grouse tours. It's a birdy time of year for Field Guides, and we hope for you as well.

On the inside pages of this newsletter, you'll find a complete listing of our 2019 tours with dates and guides. We're planning about 140 advertised departures (as well as various private tours behind the scenes), including eight new tours and three others only offered every other year (*Nowhere But Northeast Brazil, Northern India: Birds, Tiger & the Taj Mahal*, and *Guatemala: Shade-Grown Birding*). New itineraries include two in Europe.

First, in May, Birds of Britain with Megan Crewe and Willy Perez, both of whom are now based in Britain; visiting England and Scotland with these two popular guides should be a blast. And in December, Godfried Schreur, who has co-led Field Guides Spain and Iceland tours to rave reviews, will join forces with

Jay VanderGaast for what looks like a fascinating trip to the Netherlands—Holland in Winter: Birds & Art. The tour is subtitled Waterfowl Spectacle & Dutch Masters as it combines some fantastic concentrations of waterfowl that winter here with famed Dutch art and culture.

New Mexico: Birding the Land of Enchantment in January for wintering species and residents will be guided by the

dynamic duo of Doug Gochfeld and Cory Gregory, and then in May, Eric Hynes and Mitch Lysinger will team up for *Idaho: Snake River to Sawtooths* for a week-long birding adventure in that beautiful state. Eric will also be expanding his Maine coverage to a September trip for seabirds and coastal migrants, *Maine in Fall*.

Bret Whitney, who's always finding new places to go—and in Brazil he's not likely to run out of them soon—has two new trips in the works that will take you up tributaries and into forests that

few birders have ever visited, Brazil: Minas Gerais & Tocantins — Blue-eyed Ground-Dove and Beyond in May, and Brazil: Roraima Adventure in August. And finally, to round things out, Emperor Penguins in the Weddell Sea: In Search of Antarctica's Most Iconic Bird with Tom Johnson in November.



On this page, photos from three of our five Colombia tours, beginning here with Richard Webster's recent nine-day **Colombia: Medellin Escape**. Andean Cock-of-the-rock (top right) is always one of the highlights of this tour, and Richard reports that the group enjoyed cocks at point-blank range for longer than anyone wanted. (Oh, really!) Our group here is watching for Yellow-eared Parrots; with a population of around 1400 and only 200 breeding adults, it's a rare psittacid, but we were rewarded with repeated views of perched and flying birds. It's not unusual to see three-dozen or so tanagers on this trip (about the same for hummingbirds) and they include some real beauts like the Golden-crowned (far left) and the Golden, wallowing in bananas at a feeder. These folks are smiling because they've just seen a Recurve-billed Bushbird, a rare species rediscovered in 2004 and possible on our 16-day **Colombia: Bogota, the Magdalena Valley & Santa Marta** tour with Jesse Fagan (kneeling at right of the sign). Crested Ant-Tanager, at far right, is an endemic with a distinctive song; and to the left, two antpittas, Santa Marta Antpitta, formerly difficult to see before the mealworm revolution, and the tiny Rusty-breasted Antpitta. The beautiful Blue-throated Starfrontlet rounds out this slice of the 500-plus bird species recorded on the tour. (Photos by guide Jesse Fagan)







The birds—and people—pictured here and in the collage below are from our Costa Rica: Birding the Edges tours with Tom Johnson and Cory Gregory. Part One explores the southern reaches of the country, and there's a lot to see. Resplendent Quetzal, Costa Rica's bestknown bird, put on a great show for the group, even posing for a close-up. Fierythroated Hummingbird and Fiery-billed Aracari (both only in Costa Rica and Panama), with their jazzy good looks, are always among tour favorites. Rufouswinged Woodpecker is uncommon and often difficult to see, but not this year. Black-billed Nightingale-Thrush is another C.R./Panama endemic, and while lovely, it's fair to say that its beauty is in its song. 

At far right, one of Thailand's several broadbills, the Long-tailed, showing off here not so much his tail as his broad bill. Left of the broadbill, two of Thailand's many colorful flycatchers, Ultramarine at top and Hill-blue Flycatcher below it. Spot-breasted Parrotbill is an odd-looking fellow, its bill adapted for eating seeds in the reedbeds it







Alberta's Owls and More tour, guided this year by Jay VanderGaast, who designed the tour, and John Coons. From left, a much sought-after Great Gray Owl, usually the bird of the trip—especially with looks like this; Great Horned Owl, the tour's sixth owl; the aforementioned Pine Grosbeak, a hefty bird often found at northern feeders in winter; and anchoring the right, a Snowy Owl, a beautiful sight and one of three Snowies seen on the tour.







One of the hallmarks of our Cambodia: Angkor Temples & Vanishing Birds tour with Phil Gregory and Doug Gochfeld again this year was seeing some of Asia's critically endangered vultures, including this Red-headed at left; and though numbers were down this year, our group saw two. At right, one of the stone faces on the Bayon Temple at Angkor, where the tour spends three days. Above, we have Indochinese Barbet, one of several colorful barbets seen along the tour route, and Spot-billed Pelican, so-called because of the spots along its upper mandible; Cambodia is one of the last places in Southeast Asia where this species breeds in appreciable numbers. Both Marcelo and Micah are ace birders, of course, but just as importantly each is a generous guide with a ready laugh—a Field Guides kind of guide. We're very pleased to have them. They look forward to seeing you in the field, as do we all!

JULY

Newfoundland & Nova Scotia-July 1-11, 2018 with Chris Benesh & Cory Gregory. Boreal specialties, seabird colonies, and numerous breeding landbirds in the heautiful Canadian Maritimes

Jaguar Spotting in Brazil: Pantanal & Garden of the Amazon I & II-July 9-20, 2018 with Marcelo Padua & John Coons and July 21-August 1, 2018 with Marcelo Barreiros & Jesse Fagan. This short but action-packed Brazil tour features the Pantanal at its best, a nice taste of southern Amazonian birds, and excellent chances of seeing a Jaguar.

Arizona's Second Spring I & II—July 14-23, 2018 with Chris Benesh and August 4-13, 2018 with John Coons. An ideal time for visiting one of the best birding regions in North America: great for local specialties and Mexican vagrants.

Cloudforests of Ecuador: All the Best of the Wild Northwest-July 16-26, 2018 with Willy Perez. We'll be based at just two great lodges on Ecuador's west slope to experience a diversity of great birds and have the chance for a highlight mammal, Spectacled Bear.

AUGUST

Brazil's Mouth of the Amazon: Mexiana Island, the Lower Xingu & Carajas-August 2-17, 2018 with Marcelo Padua & Jay

VanderGaast. New two-week tour through diverse habitats around the mouth of the mighty Rio Amazonas as we seek most of the endemics of lower Amazonia.

Peruvian Rainforests of the Tambopata: Macaw Lick Extraordinaire—August 6-16, 2018 with Jesse Fagan & local guide. Threesite tour to the most species-rich rainforest on Earth. Largest known macaw lick, canopy walkway and towers, eagles, and monkeys.

Oregon: From the Coast to the Cascades I & II-August 29-September 8, 2018 and September 8-18, 2018 with Cory Gregory. A new itinerary for specialties of the Pacific Northwest as we explore the beautiful coast and Cascade Mountains.

SEPTEMBER

Rio Negro Paradise: Manaus, Brazil I & II-September 1-15, 2018 and September 16-30, 2018 with Bret Whitney & Marcelo Barreiros. Bird the rainforests and rivers of the mighty Amazon and Negro in an unforgettable mix of forest hikes and liveaboard luxury.

France: Camargue & Pyrenees II-September 5-15, 2018 with Jay VanderGaast. Two of Europe's finest birding destinations combined in this wonderful eleven-day tour, with varied highlights and some great French food.

Slice of California: Seabirds to Sierra I & II-September 6-15, 2018 with Chris Benesh and September 11-20, 2018 with Tom Johnson. A diverse mix of West Coast specialties, montane species, and pelagics in rugged and scenic sites.

Bolivia's Avian Riches-September 7-23, 2018 ("Bountiful Beni: Bazillions of Birds" Extension) with Dan Lane. The special bird life of the Bolivian Andes; wonderful mountain scenery.

Cape May Megan's Way I & II-September 22-28, 2018 and September 30-October 6, 2018 with Megan Edwards Crewe. See bird migration in action at one of the country's top migration hotspots.

Safari Brazil: The Pantanal & More-

September 22-October 7, 2018 (Brazilian Merganser Extension) with Marcelo Padua & Dave Stejskal. The spectacular wetlands of the Pantanal, with Hyacinth Macaws and Jabirus, combine with the many specialties of Brazil's Planalto Central to make for the perfect first birding trip to Brazil.

Ecuador's Deep NW Lowlands—September 28-October 6, 2018 with Willy Perez, Seeking hard-to-find specialties of the Choco region.

OCTOBER

Northern Peru: Endemics Galore-October 3-21, 2018 with Dan Lane. Dryseason tour to one of the least-known and most endemic-rich areas of South America. Targets geographic specialties as it surveys the rich and diverse habitats of northern Peru, including some remote and beautiful wild areas; camping no longer necessary.

South Africa-October 4-26, 2018 with Terry Stevenson & Joe Grosel. Endemic-rich birding, spectacular landscapes, and a unique flora are the highlights of our energetic survey tour of this beautiful country.

Machu Picchu & Abra Malaga, Peru-October 5-14, 2018 with Jesse Fagan. Southern Peru's east-slope, temperate birding at its best featuring several endemics and scenic Andean puna; also Machu Picchu and great subtropical birding on and near lovely hotel grounds.

New Guinea & Australia-October 11-29, 2018 with Jay VanderGaast. A rich and diverse sampler of the best birding of New Guinea and Australia.

Northwestern Argentina: The Chaco, Cordoba & Northern Andes-October 13-31, 2018 with Willy Perez & local guide. Comprehensive tour of the many habitats of the diverse northwest; many specialty birds.

Spectacular Southeast Brazil-October 19-November 4, 2018 (Part I) and November 2-18, 2018 (Part II) with Bret Whitney & Marcelo Barreiros. The fantastic center of avian endemism in eastern Brazil, particularly well endowed with hummingbirds, cotingas, antbirds, and beautiful scenery. Part I: North of the Tropic: Part II: South of the Capricorn, plus an optional Iguazu Falls Extension.

Sri Lanka—October 26-November 12, 2018 with Megan Edwards Crewe & local guide. A two-week introduction to Asia's birds, including more than two-dozen species endemic to the island, with one of the country's foremost birders as a co-leader.

Namibia & Botswana-October 30-November 18, 2018 with Joe Grosel, Southwestern Africa's bird specialties, striking scenery, wilderness, and the famed game of Etosha and the Okavango Delta.

NOVEMBER

Louisiana: Yellow Rails & Crawfish Tails-November 1-5, 2018 with Dan Lane. Late-autumn tour on the Gulf Coast targeting Yellow Rails and other migrants and wintering species of the region.

Colombia: Cali Escape: Cloudforests of the Central & Western Andes-November 3-11. 2018 with Jesse Fagan & local guide. Cloudforests of two Colombian cordilleras and their rich assortment of hummingbirds

and tanagers are highlights of this escape across the Caribbean to tropical Colombia. Starting in Cali and exiting through Manizales and Bogota, we will use several good city hotels and one simple ecotourism lodge primarily to access Andean forests, but also dry woodland, marshes, and the paramo.

Madagascar—November 3-26, 2018 (Extension: Mauritius & Reunion) with Phil Gregory & local guide. In-depth coverage of the accessible parts of Madagascar: many endemic birds, striking lemurs, bizarre flora and chameleons, fascinating culture. Optional extension to the Indian Ocean islands of Mauritius and Reunion will add yet more endemics.

Serra dos Tucanos, Brazil-November 10-20, 2018 with Marcelo Padua, A short but rich immersion in the avifauna of the Atlantic Forest, based at one lovely site near Rio.

Colombia: The Llanos & More-November 11-21, 2018 with Jesse Fagan & local guide. A short but bird-rich small-group tour to the llanos of eastern Colombia for Crestless Curassow, Pale-headed Jacamar, and Whitebearded Flycatcher, among others, plus several sites near the capital city of Bogota for a fine variety of endemics and specialties.

New Zealand—November 11-29, 2018 (Hauraki Gulf Pelagic Extension) with Dan Lane & local guide. Beautiful landscapes as a backdrop for nearly 50 endemic birds plus a great selection of seabirds.

Chile—November 11-December 1, 2018 with Willy Perez & local guide. Comprehensive survey tour of this visually spectacular and tourist-friendly country.

Holiday at San Isidro, Ecuador-November 17-26, 2018 with Mitch Lysinger. A bird-rich holiday escape based primarily at the very comfortable San Isidro Lodge.

Mexico: Yucatan & Cozumel-November 17-26, 2018 with Chris Benesh & local guide. A tour for the most interesting birds of Mexico's Yucatan Peninsula amidst its attractive Mayan sites and only a short flight from the US.

Jamaica—November 18-24, 2018 with Jay VanderGaast & local guide. A guick adventure in search of Jamaica's 27 endemics and numerous regional specialties at Green Castle Estate.

Brazil's Cristalino Jungle Lodge—November 19-30, 2018 with Marcelo Padua. A week of exciting birding in climax rainforest on the beautiful Rio Cristalino while comfortably accommodated at the Cristalino Jungle

Vietnam-November 24-December 14, 2018 with Dave Stejskal & Doug Gochfeld. Intriguing survey tour to bird-rich but poorly known Vietnam.
