I have to say that tours to the Amazon region never cease to surprise me -we always come across something different and unique which makes each
trip a fantastic memory. From the time we first got into the canoe we felt
the excitement of being in the Amazonian rainforest, with the enormous
Kapok trees in view and Greater Yellow-headed Vultures flying overhead.
As the week went on we kept seeing more fantastic birds and wildlife.
Here are a few of the highlights:

- the stunning Scale-breasted Woodpecker which landed on the canopy walkway;
- Harpy Eagle -- the most powerful eagle on earth, seen from the tower, what a moment!
- that crazy morning when we saw more than 130 species from the metal tower;
- the very rarely seen enormous and extraordinary looking Giant Anteater, a real treat:
- the bizarre looking Amazonian Umbrellabird on the edge of the Napo River:
- the challenge of trying to find the Great Jacamar, which finally appeared;
- the Tayra eating in the cecropia that was too hungry to bother worrying about us watching;
- the distant view of four bright Blue-and-yellow Macaws flying;
- an unlucky Dusky-headed Parrot that had been caught by a Rainbow boa at the parrot claylick -- "nature, red in tooth and claw."

It was great the be with all of you on this trip. We managed to witness such extraordinary natural phenomena in action -- thank you for making it possible! Thanks, too, for sharing all your great stories, knowledge, and patience, which made the trip. The Sacha Lodge crew helped us a lot as well, and a special thank you to Oscar and Pancho for their extra efforts to make everything work smoothly.
