

Trip Report — Amazonian Ecuador: Sacha Lodge II 2026

July 2-11, 2026 with Willy Perez & Local guides, Oscar Tapuy and Donaldo



The Golden-collared Toucanet is a striking species of terra firme forest in western Amazonia. During our birding, we were fortunate to get excellent views of this beautiful toucanet, and Kari Sasportas captured this fantastic portrait of a male, showing off its distinctive golden collar and colorful plumage.

There is something about returning to Sacha that is difficult to put into words. This was our second tour of 2026, and although I know some of what to expect, the Amazon once again managed to surprise me. Our adventure started in Quito. After a short flight across the Andes, we landed in the town of Coca and met Oscar (our local guide) and the Sacha Lodge team.

From there, the real journey began. We climbed aboard our motor canoe and headed downstream along the Napo River. For around two hours, we watched the landscape change around us as we travelled deeper into the

Amazon. The noise and bustle of Coca gradually disappeared, replaced by forest, river and the feeling that we were heading somewhere very special.

Eventually, we left the motor canoe behind and walked through the forest for about 30 minutes. The final part of the journey was by dugout canoe, paddling our way towards the lodge. By the time we arrived at Sacha, you really feel that you've left the outside world behind. Sacha Lodge is a wonderful place to spend a week. It is comfortable, the food is excellent and the staff seem to anticipate everything you might need. Most importantly, it puts us right in the middle of the rainforest, with wildlife all around us.

Our first afternoon was an easy introduction. We paddled across the Pilchecocha Lagoon and along the Orquidea Creek, taking in the surroundings and getting our first taste of the wildlife. It wasn't long before we found one of our first special birds, the striking Orange-crested Manakin, which is one of the specialties of the Igapo forest.

From there, the week gathered momentum, as one of the first visits to the towers gave us an incredible view into the canopy. We spent hours watching colourful tanagers moving through the trees. Green-and-gold, Turquoise and Opal-rumped, were among the highlights, and seeing these birds so close and almost at eye level was simply magical.



The Kapok Tower proved to be a fantastic place to enjoy colorful birds at remarkably close range. Among the highlights were these handsome males Gilded Barbets, which gathered together in the canopy and gave us wonderful opportunities for close up photography. Kari Sasportas captured this beautiful image.

Of course, we always have a few birds on our wish list, particularly the difficult and elusive ones. Our patience was rewarded with an excellent view of a Chestnut-capped Puffbird, exactly the sort of encounter that makes all the searching worthwhile.

One of the biggest highlights of the trip was our visit to the parrot clay lick in the Yasuní National Park area. At first, there wasn't much happening, then the Cobalt-winged Parakeets started to arrive. Gradually, more birds appeared, and before long we were watching parrots, parakeets and

colourful macaws gathering together. The arrival of the Red-and-green and Scarlet Macaws was particularly spectacular. Watching these magnificent birds gather and descend to the clay lick to drink the mineral rich water was one of those experiences that everyone will remember. It was wonderful to just stand there and take it all in.

Another favourite day took us to the Kapok Tower. A fruiting tree nearby was attracting an amazing selection of birds, and we had some fantastic views. Gilded and Lemon-throated Barbets, Plum-throated Cotinga, Chestnut-eared, Many-banded Aracaris, Cream-colored, Ringed and Waved woodpeckers all put in appearances. There was so much going on that we were constantly looking in different directions, wondering what would turn up next. Then we noticed a sloth feeding on the young leaves. We watched as it slowly made its way down the tree, completely unconcerned by the audience nearby. It was a lovely, peaceful moment and one of those encounters that you see just in nature documentaries.



The Masked Tanager is a colorful canopy species of the Amazonian lowlands. While visiting the canopy towers, we once again came face to face with several of these attractive tanagers as they moved through the treetops. Kari Sasportas was ready with her camera and captured this excellent photograph.

Away from the towers, we spent plenty of time exploring the creeks and lagoons around the lodge. We found Giant Otters, Yellow-spotted Amazon River Turtles and Spectacled Caimans, while some of the group were lucky enough to see a Green Anaconda. The birding was super enjoyable; we recorded Ringed, Green and Rufous kingfishers, as well as the much more usual American Pygmy. Moving quietly along the Amazon waterways, never quite knowing what might appear next, was a big part of the fun.

Then came the river islands and plenty of mud! Getting around was not always easy, but the effort was worth it. We found Spotted Tody-Flycatcher and Black-and-white Antbird and spent time searching for some of more elusive species like Gray-breasted Crake that we saw crossing over the grass. These searches can sometimes test your patience. You hear a bird, catch a glimpse of movement and then spend what seems like an age trying to work out exactly where it is. But when you finally find it and get a good view, the satisfaction is enormous. Silver, Spot-backed Antbirds and Black-spotted Bare-eye were some particularly memorable finds. They gave us excellent views and reminded us why we enjoy the challenge of birding in the rainforest.



Lemon-throated Barbet is primarily a species of lowland forest, where it is especially likely to be found along forest edges and in clearings, often close to water. This handsome male gave us a great photographic opportunity, beautifully captured here by Kari Sasportas.

And then there was the rain! During one of our forest walks, the heavens suddenly opened. Within minutes, the trail had become a stream, and we were wading through water and mud. It was wet, uncomfortable and slightly chaotic, but also great fun. You can't really visit the Amazon without getting properly soaked at least once, and this was certainly a memorable way to experience it.

Looking back on the week, it is the collection of moments that stand out most. The excitement when a difficult bird finally appeared. The sudden arrival of a flock of colourful macaws. Watching a sloth slowly feeding below us. Quietly drifting along a creek with a kingfisher on the side. The laughter and inevitable mud on the river islands. And, of course, that tropical downpour.

Sacha gave us another wonderful week, but for us it was much more than a list of birds and wildlife. It was about being together, exploring somewhere

extraordinary and enjoying whatever the Amazon decided to give us each day. We came home with plenty of great memories, a few muddy clothes, countless photographs and, as always, the feeling that we had only scratched the surface of this incredible place.

One thing is certain, we will be very happy to return to Sacha again. Thank you, everyone, for some seriously fun birding.



The Chestnut-capped Puffbird is a relatively small member of the puffbird family and one that is easy to recognize once seen. Its bright chestnut crown, contrasting black mask, and prominent black breast band set it apart from the other puffbirds. Kari Sasportas captured this wonderful portrait of the species.

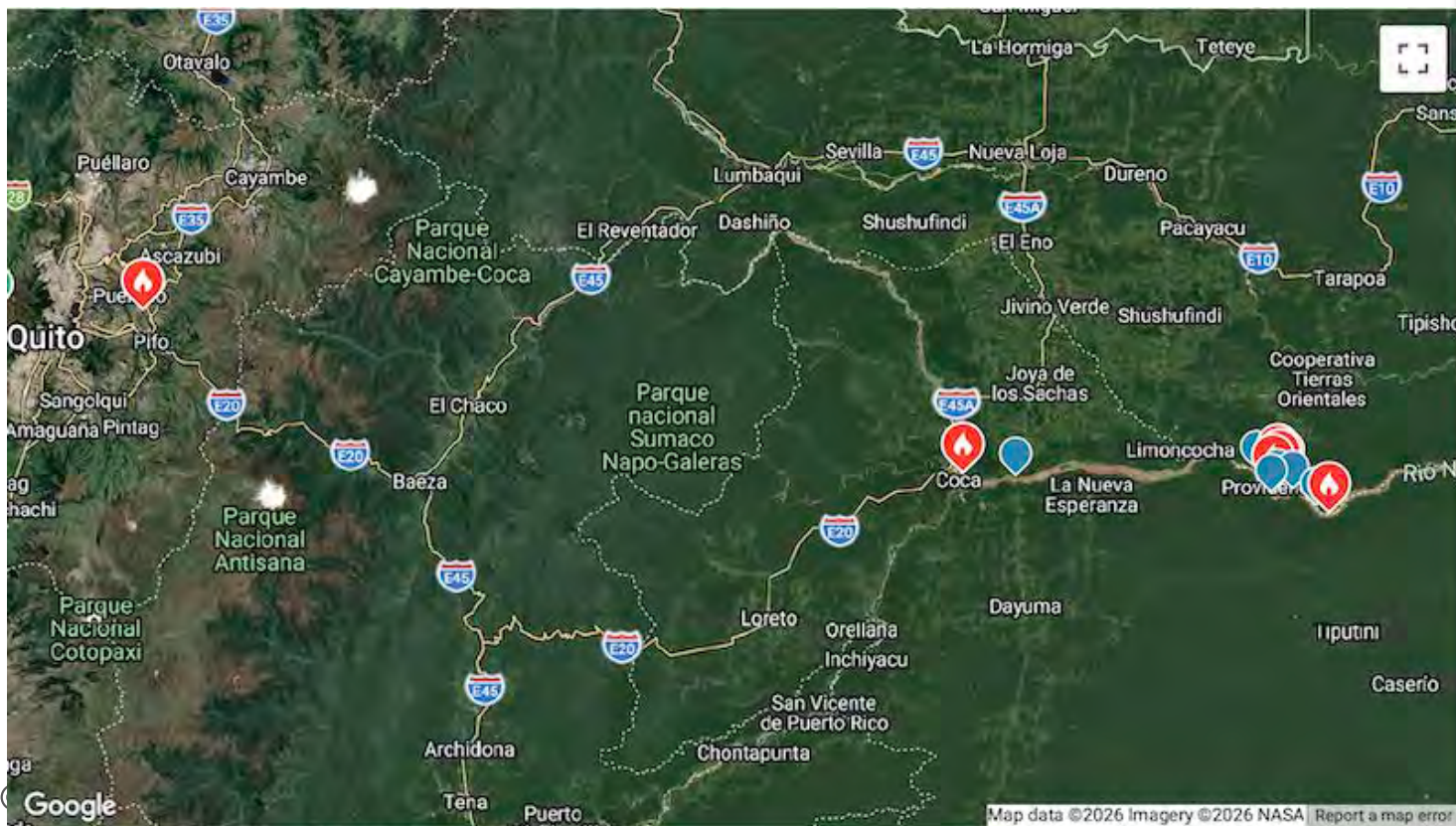
